

## Summary of relevant skills and experiences

Giulia Donadio (Naples, 1987) is Assistant Professor of Comparative Private Law at the University of Pisa, where she currently teaches Comparative Private Law and Private Law.

She holds an Excellence Degree (with honors) in European Private Law from the Scuola Sant'Anna (2011) and a Master's Degree in Private Law (with honors) from the University of Pisa (2010).

She gained her PhD degree (with honors) from the Scuola Superiore S. Anna in 2014 and afterwards she worked as a Post-Doctoral Researcher in Private Law and European Private Law at the University of Pisa.

Her post-doctoral research focused on Anti-Discrimination Law and horizontal effects of Non-Discrimination Principle, with special attention for the interaction between Party Autonomy - on the one hand - and Fundamental Rights and anti-discriminatory statutes - on the other hand.

She is the author of a book on the impact of Non-Discrimination Principle on Contract Law (2017), which analyses the topic in a comparative perspective, and of several other publications in national and international books and reviews. Giulia is a Fellow of the European Law Institute (ELI) and a member of the Special Group of Interest (SIG) established by the ELI on European Family and Succession Law.

Her teaching and research interests especially deal with the connection between national law and EU law in the context of Private Law. She has been responsible for the course of European Private Law for international incoming students at the University of Pisa (academic year 2017/2018) and member of the teaching staff of the Summer School on European Private Law and Fundamental Rights (2014, 2015 and 2016).

She has been a visiting researcher at the Max Planck Institute for Comparative and International Private Law (Hamburg, 2012) and at the University of Oxford (2013) and participates in several Study Groups and Networks of Researchers from all European Member States.
